ZONE 4 CO-ORDINATOR REPORTS ON PCA BOARD MEETING

Mike Robbins prepared a $2\frac{1}{2}$ page report on the National Board meeting held in Houston, Jan. 23 & 24, for the Region Presidents in Zone 4 and the following is a condensed and edited version of what I felt was of interest to our membership.

'72 PARADE AWARDED to Chicago Region - to be held in Lake Geneva, Wisconsin area - probably at the Playboy Club.

A new committee -NATIONAL POLICY - has been formed to look at the needs and desires of members from an activities viewpoint and to look at external influences - distributors, factory, etc.

Regions will soon receive a letter detailing coverages on new insurance policy. Public liability increased to \$1,000,000. Be sure to use WAIVERS at all events.

Approximately 6,500 members at the end of 1970.

New region chartered - ALL of ALASKA.

Old procedure of new Porsche buyers receiving a letter from POAC re PCA not being used by Porsche-Audi. Dealer bulletin board supplants the former practice. Copies of Panorama are not to be put in dealer bulletin boards but can be mailed to prospective members. Bulletin board use violates mailing classification requirements.

Inexpensive paperback reprints of the current Porsche coverage in Automobile Quarterly will soon be available through the Executive Secretary's office. Details in Panorama.

PARADE- 121 reservations as of Jan.18- this is half of last year's total. In order to obtain the use of the overall facilities, you must stay at Sun Valley resort-no camping or other motels- the price range should be able to offer everyone what he feels he can afford.

Increased opportunity to ATTEND OTHER REGION'S EVENTS this year. S.E.M. chigan is planning a weekend at Waterford Hills, Nord Stern will have their second year at Donnybrooke, Chicago at Elkhart Lake and St.Louis is considering a Mini-Parade in conjunction with other regions. COME ON OUT IN THE GARAGE FOR A MINUTE

Since it is considered acceptable to reprint material from other regions' newsletters, providing we credit the source, Mike Robbins selected the following two articles for your information and enjoyment.

TECH: 356 series - Carp popping and worn ball pin ...

Those with Zenith 32NDIX carburetors may experience loose throttle linkage on the ball connection, left side, facing engine directly behind fan housing. It was originally welded solid, and entire rod could only be disconnected by removing right side nut. But if the left side becomes loose, entire linkage is then loose, and you can attempt to balance the carbs, but they will never be "right on." I had this problem on my 356A, but when checking around to correct the problem, no one had the answer. I purchased a ball with opposite threaded section (part #999-167-014-02) for the grand total of 35¢. I then proceeded with my hacksaw to the now-very-loose ball linkage and removed same...then I filed the hole to accept the new ball and now have a very smooth linkage system, and my Uni-Syn does the job it was intended for.

....a little reminder to any of you 356 buffs - don't forget to check your flexible brake lines, especially those in the rear. Fronts are easy to check, but if you don't get your car in the air or a good look, the rear lines can be forgotten. I was certain I had good brakes as it was supposedly checked over when brake linings, turned drums and replacement of the brake cylinders was performed. Examine closely, and you may find that the flex line may be weak at the "first" bend at twin junction, and the hardest one to spot is where the support strap wraps around each line. Dirt gets inside the strap and with age will continue to rub on the line. When I removed mine, I found these areas to be extremely "soft". The quickest way to remove both lines is to cut them at convenient section so twisting will not occur when removing...be careful when loosening the connections as the solid tubes may twist, and you will be replacing more than anticipated ... it is also a good time to flush the line, so have some good brake fluid on hand (plus a friend) ... once new lines (around \$15.00) are connected and tested for leakage, you will feel much more at ease when competing, not to mention the safety factor on our highways... TIRE CODING SYSTEM (Windblown Witness, San Diego Region-Feb., 1971)

Have you ever noticed an unfamiliar tire brand? Especially a tire of a strange brand that looks like it would make your Porsche handle like a group seven race car. You know thekind, super cornering, wear forever, save you two dollar tread pattern; but it has a crazy name law like "The Drag Race High Miler" or "The Peach Blossom Tranquility Special"and you can't figure out who is the real manufacturer. Good news, every tire sold in the United States has a manufacturers code number included in the data on the sidewall of the tire. Here is a list of the codes for most major tire manufacturers:
