Many of your region's members subscribe to Car and Driver and we would like to point out an erroneous article that appears in the March issue. On page 67, Car and Driver says the Porsche 914/6 has been dropped from production.

This is not true. The 914/6 continues to be made and to be sold. There are no plans to cease marketing this car. (Just check the ad for the 914/6 on page 24 of the same issue that says it's dropped.)

The magazine was aware of this but the issue was already printed and mailing was beginning. The publisher sent an advance copy and a letter to each Porsche/Audi dealer explaining the foul-up.

In addition, the next (April) issue will contain a retraction along with information on the 914/6 used in GT racing.

PORSCHE PROFILE: THE COOPERS

Another prominent Porsche pushing pair(how's that for alliteration?) in our club has "his and hers"Porsches. It really doesn't work this way entirely, because they each drive both cars. Mike and Sharon Cooper have a white, 1966, 912 and a bright green 356B, 1961 roadster. The roadster is mostly Mike's because he races in it, but he and Sharon both drive it in Solo II events-"with vigor!". They were both entered in the 912 in the most recent SCCA Gymkhana because the competition car is being prepared for the impending racing season.

The Coopers live in Zionsville, with "Mikie", aged 4, (nicknamed "Devil") and an underslung female Dalmation-Bassett, named "Natasha". Last fall, participants at an SCCA SoloII at IRP were puzzled to hear Sharon request over the loudspeaker that "Mike Cooper report to "Moby Dick". It seems that this is their affectionate name for the white Chrysler sedan that serves as tow car for the race car and otherwise family transportation.

The Coopers'most recent triumph was the overall 1st place they accomplished in a recent SCCA Beginner's Rally with an entry of 120 cars. They were ineligible for a trophy because they had run two previous SCCA rallies, but they had never achieved a trophy before, so they really are barely more than beginners at rallying. This performance makes them appear to be a threat in still another area of competition. They both have that combination of ability and desire that makes winners out of competitors.
