

# Tools for the road

The Porsche tool kit supplied by the factory is not a bad set of tools, but can be replaced or improved upon with a few simple tools and parts.

Many people have purchased used Porsches only to find the original tool kit incomplete or missing. Furthermore, some of the factory-supplied tools are not always suited to do the jobs for which they were intended —— the lug wrench and the jack being examples.

The lug wrench does not have enough leverage to loosen the lug nuts, especially those on mag alloy wheels which have a tendency to freeze up. The jack is weak and does not properly support the car. This can result in personal injury or body damage to the car.

The following is a list of tools and parts that should be a part of every Porsche road kit:

- \* 1/2 inch flex handle
- \* 3/4-19mm or 11/16-17mm six-point deep socket (depending on model)
- \* a good scissors jack
- \* 13mm combination wrench
- \* 10mm combination wrench
- \* short blade screwdriver
- \* number 2 Phillips screwdriver
- \* 22mm or 7/8 socket for alternator belts (911 only)
- \* air compressor or tire pump for cars with space saver tires
- \* set of ignition points (if applicable)
- \* cooling belts and/or alternator belts
- \* an assortment of fuses

There isn't much racing going on in the midwest this time of year (Unless you wan't to spike the tires on your new 911 and go ice racing, wheel to wheel in Michigan ). I don't believe many CIR members will be inquiring about spiking their tires. I do however, wonder why driving events are absent from the CIR agenda, as so many surrounding PCA regions have an entire schedule of driving events.

Having traveled the midwest, racing in the SCCA's Solo II and PRO Solo programs, I've met many PCA members participating and competing against me. These same people are very active in their local PCA races, solos, and autocrosses. These events are held at local airports, parking lots, and even road racing tracks. You drive your car around a course marked with pylons, tripping a timing device as you cross the start line and at the finish. If any pylons are hit while driving the course there is a penalty of usually 2 seconds. The challenge of the event is essentially "You against the Clock". We as Humans seem to have to guage ourself against our peers, however.

Whether you are competing in a PCA or an SCCA event there are many different classes equalizing cars of different makes and models, having different acceleration and handling characteristics. There is a class for your family sedan, for your 911, 914, 356, 928, and even your Champ car if you happen to have one in the garage. The PCA classes Porsches primarily on performance modifications made other than those available from the factory as an option. So whether you have a bone stock 914, or a tube frame 911 there is a class for you.

All you need now is some interest ( let me know ), a car, a valid drivers license, seat belt, and helmet ( borrow one ) and you're ready to go.

I'm attempting to schedule two joint events in 1985 with the INDY Region SCCA. It appears they have attained a new site, it just happens to be an auto testing grounds, having a 1.2 mile road course, and a 400 by 600 ft. skid pad ( God's gift to Solo ). More information will follow on that. INDY Region SCCA has also given CIR an open invitation to attend any or all of their 1985 Solo II events. I will publish their schedule in the next newsletter.

Those of you interested in this type of Driving event, and attending a drivers school in March, please let me know. Also, don't hesitate to send me your input on any of my newsletters, and your questions about racing, driving events, suspension prep. etc.

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GOOD HUNTING

Last month I suggested you park your Porsche for the winter. However, there must be a few Porsche owners who are not readers of this publication as I have seen them graceing the roads - shame on them! You however did, and your hot rod is safely tucked in, warm and snug. But now whenever the sun peeks out you have the irresitable urge to drive - a little snow won't hurt, right? Sacriledge!

Perhaps if you did some work to it you would be able to control yourself. Well, this month I'll suggest we go looking for that evil wicked enemy RUST.

There are a few things that you can do to help control this problem that are very basic and there are typical spots to look at on all models of cars. Here's what you'll need: a wire brush, a narrow scraper, an old screw driver, some coarse sandpaper and a rust inhibitor. Now most rust inhibitors are just that; they inhibit, they don't stop the rust, and some work better than others. I've not had any luck with Naval Jelly but would suggest Duro's product "Extend" or Morton's "Rust Mort" and even good old Rustolium "Rusty Metal Primer" (be sur it is the Rusty Metal Primer you use as they have others).

The problem is when the undercoating or body caulk draws away from the metal exposing it to the elements. Poke around (I'll tell you where in a minute until you find some loose spots. Pry and scrape it off exposing the area. Then brush and sand the dusty rust off as best you can. Apply the treatment or primer, whichever you choose. After it dries you can apply some spray or brush undercoating if you wish. Now this obviously won't check all rust. Depending on the severity, sandblasting or removing and replacing the panel may be necessary. However, this is all you can do without seeking professional help.

The typical problem areas are:

- along all seams where panels come together
- behind door posts where dirt collects
   wheel wells around suspension pick-ups
- 4. inside removable rocker panels, especially 914 rocker panels
- 5. headlight and tailight buckets
- 6. bumper seals
- 7. under spare tires in the trunk
- 8. under carpet panels and behind pedal assemblies
- 9. basically the entire undercarriage

A good washing with a power sprayer before you start your inspection will help. This also gives you an excuse to drive the car somewhere. However, don't go out of state to find a carwash.

I hope this helps and you don't find anything too scary. If so don't paniq it can be repaired. Just call us. Good luck and good hunting!
