A total of 95 drivers signed up to learn and hone their car control skills on Putnam Park's 2 mile, 10 turn, purpose built road racing course. Drivers ranged from Robert Caldwell whose father arranged for both a car and his entry fee as Robert's 18th birthday present (how cool is that!).... to guest Instructor Phil Kreuger, a top ten finisher in the 1988 Indy 500.

CIR was well represented with 41 participants, of which twenty served as instructors for the event! 

- <u>Corner workers</u> act as an extra set of eyes and ears working alongside an experienced corner flagger. Best "seats" in the house, close to the action. 7am to 5 PM Sat & Sunday
- <u>Timing and Scoring</u> Highly coveted positions as they are located in the air-conditioned tower on the front straight. Positions include "runners" to copy and distribute practice session/race results, and "tapers" who serve as a back-up to the electronic timing a scoring. Hours: 7-5 Sat and Sunday
- Registration Work under the "big top", distribute race packets, check race licenses, insure waivers are signed etc. Friday afternoon and Saturday morning hours.
- <u>Scrutineer Assistants</u> Helps PCA National Scrutineer with racer technical inspection line, check log books. Friday afternoon, Saturday morning hours.
- <u>Pit and Grid</u> Control flow of race cars in/out of false grid, stage cars by practice times, assist racers with window nets, assure doors, lids, trunks are closed. If you like being close to race cars this is for you! 7-5 Sat and Sunday
- Hospitality Take care of about 40 club race volunteers, plan box lunches, distribute drinks, umbrellas, sunscreen etc. Make friends with ice water! 7-5 Sat and Sunday

#### AND MORE...



You know those funeral processions in which a couple of motorcycle "cops" escort the entourage by blocking traffic at the intersections...leapfrogging each other to the next intersection. Imagine a line of over 200 356 Porsches being convoved by 2 or 3 motorcycles and a couple of squad cars for 13 miles. There were no doubt a lot of exasperated "civilian" drivers waiting for our stream of traffic to pass. I felt sorry for anyone who was running late to work or otherwise anxious to get moving. But Charleston is big on tourism so they stretch things a little to keep those dollars coming into the area. Our destination was a Civil War era plantation just outside of town. 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
