last few years, a fact that is simply amazing.



INDIANAPOLIS - APRIL 17, 2020 - The Central Indiana Region of the Porsche Club of America (CIR-PCA) board of directors voted to donate \$1000.00 to each of five foodbanks in the central Indiana area.

he club has a long history of giving; with well over \$100,000 committed to philanthropic causes in just the last ten years. The CIR-PCA board met this week, in an emergency session to discuss the current crisis for the needy in our State. Indiana is facing record unemployment.

Club president, Rob Fike said, "As we continue to navigate through these unprecedented times, things are constantly changing as you know. While some of us are only mildly affected by the epidemic, many of our Hoosier brothers and sisters, are horribly affected. Either by contracting the virus itself, or by the financial devastation it is producing by the lockdown and job loss. 

Porsely at the Indianapolis 500

Part 1 - "Corners Fine, No Power"

First of a series on Porsche Indy car history

Tom Beeler is a long time CIR member and has been a motorsports journalist for over 30 years. His extensive car collection includes a couple of Porsche's, several Indy 500 pace cars, an E-Type Jag, a McLaren (that's for sale) and even an AMC Gremlin.

ver the years, major foreign manufacturers had attempted several times to qualify for, and win, the venerable Indianapolis 500-Mile Race

In the earliest days of the 500, Peugeot left an indelible mark, winning the 1913, 1916, and 1919 races.

Three-time Indy winner Wilbur Shaw drove his Mike Boyle-owned Maserati 8CTF to Victory Lane in 1939 and 1940, and was leading in 1941, on his way to a third-straight victory, when one of his wire wheels collapsed three-quarters of the way through the race. After WWII, Alfa-Romeo, Mercedes-Benz, and Ferrari came to Indianapolis in privateer and factory efforts, but failed to achieve any real measure of success.

By the 1960s, the heavy, front-engined Indy car design gave way to the lower profiles of rear-engine designs — Lotus Cars of England leading the way. An explosion of novel engineering creativity followed. The field of the 1965 Indianapolis 500 was composed of fifteen different chassis designs.

Innovation had become the name of the game.

And that spirit of innovation hit Southern California midget driver Albert Stein square on the head. Seeing the new boxer engines in the recently introduced Porsche 911, Stein had an epiphany. One 911 engine wouldn't have enough power to keep up with the Indianapolis Meyer-Drake Offenhauser engines (400 hp) and Ford Indy DOHC four-cam engines (425 hp) currently running.

But TWO might.

One engine powered the front wheels, the other powered the rear wheels.





Having secured a deal from a friend to buy new 2.0L Porsche 901 boxer engines from Europe, Stein had veteran Indy chassis builder Joe Huffaker build a low chassis to accommodate two Porsche engines — one driving the front wheels, one driving the rear wheels — thus taking advantage of the Indy-sanctioning United States Auto Club rules allowing for four-wheel drive.

The arrangement also allowed the car to run four Indy car rear wheels all the way around the car, thus providing much better grip.

The key, though, was that the Porsche flat-sixes, mounted low in the chassis, gave the car a spectacularly low center of gravity, and a great ability to manage the 9-degree Indianapolis Motor Speedway banking.

The notion of a twin-engined Indy car was not new. Motorcoach builder William Fageol brought a twin





Offenhauser-engined car to the 500 in 1946, with veteran Paul Russo driving. The car handled incredibly-well, it was said — enough so that Russo qualified the car second, in the center of the front row. Unfortunately, the car's day ended early, when it spun in another car's oil and hit the wall.

Stein hired six-time Indy veteran driver, Bill Cheesbourg — to drive the Stein-Porsche. Cheesbourg's best start was ninth in 1961, and best finish was 10th in 1958. He was no stranger to the challenges of Indy, but hadn't yet shown great success.

It's worth noting that Cheesbourg had spread himself a little thin that May. He was also attempting to work the bugs out of a turbine-powered Quin Epperly laydown roadster.


As it ended up, neither car wound up having the "oomph" they needed to make the Big Show.

Stein's Huffaker-Porsche evidently had adequate power and stability in the corners, as one might expect, but simply couldn't generate enough horsepower to compete with established power plants on Indy's long front and back straights. At a best average of 149 mph, the Porsche was about ten miles per hour off the pace to make the field, and over 15 mph behind eventual polesitter Mario Andretti.

The car was later dismantled, and its parts scattered to the winds. The body panels reportedly still live on in race shops around southern California.

Porsche's inaugural appearance at Indianapolis was disappointing, but not too surprising. With no factory support, and Stein's failure to acquire the yet-to-be-released 911S camshafts, the Stein Huffaker-Porsche would eventually come to be remembered as one of the more unusually designed cars to enter the Greatest Spectacle in Racing.

A little more than a decade later, Porsche would give Indy its complete focus.



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A Revo Institute VISIT

late winter get-away to Florida's

west coast allowed the opportunity to visit Naples and one of the most significant automotive museums in the country. The Revs Institute includes

historically significant automobiles built from 1896-1995. Also a part of the Institute is a vast library of automotive books and literature as well as hundreds of thousands

of historic photos, most now digitized.

An entire section of the automotive collection is dedicated to Porsche competition cars, said to be the most important outside the Porsche factory museum in Stuttgart. From the 1950 356SL Gmund Coupe to the 1971 917K, the collection spans the first 20+ years of Porsche

competition history. Virtually all of the cars presented have a significant competition history with many class and overall victories on the domestic and international stage. Unusual for an automotive museum, there are no



to. When a complaint gets to me, and that is rare, it means the sales or service team could not take care of the issue. I want my team to take responsibility and fix any customer issues, long before they get to me. A Porsche buyer is a little different. Most often, they buy a Porsche because they feel they earn it. They want to buy one. So we are truly advisors more than salesmen in that purchase."


Porsche, more that most other car companies, stays involved with ongoing training of all marketing and service staff. All of Tom Wood's sales team are Certified Porsche Brand Ambassadors. They receive on-going training and support from PCNA; as does the service team.

Until COVID hit, Tom Wood was on track to sell over 250 new cars this year, with more that half, custom ordered, in the world of Porsche, that is huge. Now it is hard to tell how sales will be affected. "We will still sell everything we can get. Just not sure what that number will be," said John.

Barb, John's wife and a full CIR/PCA member, John is an affiliate member, are thrilled to be here. They live in Westfield, love the Indianapolis area and plan on being with TW for a long time.

PORSCHE —— A Big Part of SVRA's Speed Tour

o many of you appreciate car collectors and vintage racers, so we took the opportunity to catch up with Tony Parella, President and CEO of America's premier vintage racing club — Sportscar Vintage Racing Association ("SVRA"). Tony retired from an impressive career as a top officer of companies in the telecommunications industry about ten years ago. A car collector and a life-long racer, Tony saw the potential of SVRA

in 2012 and purchased the organization to quickly mold it into a racing series with a national platform.

Founded in 1978, SVRA has grown steadily to 2,500 active members with a database of over 16,000 race cars. Race weekends take place at some of the finest racing venues in the United States, including: the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, WeatherTech Raceway Laguna Seca, Lime Rock Park, Sebring Raceway, Road America, Watkins Glen International, Road Atlanta, the Mid-Ohio Sports Car Course, Portland International Raceway, Auto Club Speedway, and Virginia International Raceway (VIR).

With those iconic venues on the schedule, Parella has been successful in increasing fan attendance and sponsorship attraction. Among the major brand sponsors are Jaguar, Land Rover, NetJets, Sunoco, Avis, Mazda Motorsports, Big Machine Vodka, Remington, TireRack.com, RACELOGIC, and Marathon Coach.

A big part of the appeal to Parella's events is a festival-like environment best exemplified by what he calls "SpeedTour." Parella is also the majority owner of the Trams Am Series presented by Pirelli which joins SVRA at most of the tracks. SpeedTour also includes the International GT series (IGT) that presents the Stuttgart Cup for late model Porsches and the Maranello Cup for Ferrari. The Stuttgart series features Cayman 3.4 and 3.8 liter cars as well as 996, 997, and other GT3 cars from the last decade.

Other features of SpeedTour includes the Hagerty Insurance car shows where local enthusiasts can show off their pride and joy in judged competition. Regularly, SVRA presents featured marques that draw an



impressive display of crowd favorites. Participants are provided race entries at no fee and a showcase race restricted to the featured marques. In 2019 Porsche was the featured marques at the Road Atlanta round of the schedule.

A big hit among race fans is the Vintage Race of Champions (VROC) series featuring famous auto racing champions of the past from a variety of the sport's disciplines — INDYCAR, NASCAR, short tracks and a variety of road racing series. Drivers represent tremendous diversity from the Chili Bowl to Formula One. Last year's class champions included Willy T. Ribbs, the first black driver to qualify at Indy, Davy Jones, 1996 Le Mans 24 champion, and long-time NASCAR front-runner Wally Dallenbach, Jr. The events are Pro-Am contests with proceeds from entry fees and memorabilia auctions going to charity. Over \$1M has been gifted to a variety of charities during the last seven years. Two-time Indianapolis 500 champion Al Unser, Jr. won the original Charity Pro-Am at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway in 2014.

Like all of us, Parella greeted 2020 with big plans and lots of enthusiasm. Instead, the COVID-19 pandemic took center stage and an entirely new game plan had to be designed on the fly. Still, it appears that the revised SVRA schedule will still allow for as many race weekends as originally planned, albeit with some jumbling of dates. In Indiana, the popular Brickyard Invitational has been postponed from its original Father's Day weekend to a date yet-to-be determined. Indiana's restrictions on the size of gatherings until July 4 forced the change and the Road America Vintage Festival in Wisconsin will fill that void. Parella, who says, "We want to make SVRA racing safer than going to the grocery store," is ever-optimistic he can design a new normal for vintage racing.



e all look forward to the spring when we can get out with our Porsches and see all our buddies. This year was especially hard with the pandemic situation. Registration was held in the entry building to the track, with all proper guidelines followed, wearing masks and practicing social distancing. Rose Nichols and her team greeted all of the drivers with a 'COVID-safe' process to exchange tech forms, waivers, and wrist bands. The track gate workers checked the forehead temperature for everyone entering the track grounds. All of this in compliance with local jurisdiction and following PCA guidelines, we all felt in a safe environment.

With the quick notice that YES we can have this event, and budget concerns, the Ohio Valley Region team came up with the most creative SWAG I've seen. With the Mid Ohio track rules requiring a mask, and while most of us already have one, here we were presented with a new mask for the event — no excuses.

In typical PCA DE fashion, the on-track days begin with a Drivers Meeting. Jeff Woodward, DE Chair for OVR, welcomed everyone and explained the protocols to follow. Practicing Social Distancing was the rule of the day and followed by all. Friday was an open lapping day for over 80 drivers. How wonderful to get back on track for 2020!

Saturday, our numbers over doubled. Participants were from many regions within Zone 4, including Southeast Michigan, Northern Ohio, Maumee Valley, Mid-Ohio, Eastern Buckeye, Allegheny and Central Indiana — with a few from Zone 13 and even a Florida license plate! Drivers were assigned to 1 of 5 run groups that ran on schedule all day. The on-premise snack bar opened for us from 11a.m. — 1p.m. so we could stay at the track over the break on Saturday and Sunday. We so much appreciated them working hard to provide us great lunch options and picnic tables in the shade.

Additionally, OVR managed to create a charity dimension by selling driver track photos to benefit the Children's Tumor Foundation. Photographer John McKean spent hours at the infield corners capturing the action, and posting proofs on his website. All proceeds are donated.

What a great way to get our 2020 DE season on Zone 4 underway, albeit a few months later than usual. Hats off to Ohio Valley Region President Bill Altvater, and DE Chair Jeff Woodward, and all of the volunteers. And their capable team of CDIs in Gary and Dale. We look forward to many more great track HPDE events in 2020. See you there!

Currently, all PCA Sim Racing is conducted on the iRacing platform.


The new committee's members are Jim Legault (Chairperson), Rusty Pruden, and Keith Morgan.

BLACK CLOTH TOPS

o you own a Boxster or Cabriolet with a black cloth top and does it continually get little white specks and dirt on it that are difficult to remove? Try using an adhesive lint roller, like you use to pick up pet hair and roll your clothes. Works like a charm and your fabric top will never look better! Roll your top before you wash your car while it is still dry. It works better that way. It should also work on other color fabric tops, but is most effective on black tops. Put a roller in your trunk for long trips.

Never use a leather chamois or towel to dry your top. Never scrub it with a wash mitt or rag. You'll be sorry with all the tiny little lint particles left behind, which are very difficult to remove. After rolling, just hose it down and let it air dry. Then if there are any left-over flecks, just use the lint roller — after it is totally dry. If you need to scrub your top to remove dirt or stubborn stains (bird poop), the preferred method is to use a soft bristle brush (or toothbrush for small spots) with lukewarm soapy water, rub gently in the direction of the fabric and rinse thoroughly. Remember to get any stubborn stains off as quickly as possible before they do permanent damage to the fabric.

If you want to clean your cloth top, Porsche dealers carry an excellent Cleaner and Preservative. I have also heard that a product called Ragg Top is an excellent preservative for cloth tops. Your top should be treated at least twice a year. Once your

fabric top is preserved it will bead water, not dry easily and the best way to dry it then is to use a rubber squeegee. You'll know when it no longer beads water, it's time to preserve it again.

Additionally, your Owner's Manual has a very thorough discussion on Convertible Top Maintenance and should be read before doing anything to your top. Following their instructions will add many years to the life of your fabric top.

"I think God must have had something to do with it."




